




A Partnership to Bring Back the American Burying Beetle

This summer will mark five consecutive years that the St. Louis Zoo, the Missouri Department of Conservation, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Nature Conservancy have worked to bring back the federally endangered American burying beetle (*Nicrophorus americanus*) by releasing captive-bred beetles onto Wah'Kon-Tah Prairie in southwest Missouri. This large, brilliantly colored beetle (about 1 ¼" in length) was previously found in 35 states and several provinces encompassing the eastern half of the U.S. and southern Canada. Starting around the mid-1950s, the beetles were extirpated from the core of their range likely due to habitat loss / fragmentation and declines in bird and mammal populations that they rely on for carrion resources (e.g., bobwhite quail, wild turkey, greater prairie chicken, passenger pigeon – extinct, etc.). Today, only one remnant population remains in the east with scattered populations found in the six states on its western front.

These charismatic beetles perform an important ecological service. They serve as nature's undertakers, utilizing animal carrion to feed and raise their young. The strong flying American burying beetles use their highly sensitive antennae to locate vertebrate carrion, sometimes at great distances. The adults will feed on carrion of any size, but if they find a carcass that is in the range of 150-200g, a mated male-female pair will roll the carcass into a ball, coat it with their specialized saliva that slows the microbial decomposition process, bury it in an underground nest chamber, and deposit their eggs nearby. From there, the adult beetles perform a truly unusual activity. They practice biparental care – both parents feed and protect the developing larvae for the first several days after hatching – a behavior unique for beetles in particular and insects in general.

Since 2005, the St. Louis Zoo has been breeding American burying beetles so that they can be reintroduced into Missouri and other states as part of the national recovery effort. After five years of releases, it appears that the American burying beetle population on Wah'Kon-Tah Prairie is growing. Over the coming years, MDC, the St. Louis Zoo, and partner organizations will be using mark-recapture efforts to assess the size and health of the beetle population in addition to small mammal and breeding bird surveys to develop a better understanding of carrion resources available for the beetles. Hopefully, our efforts will show that a viable and self-sustaining population of these endangered beetles can be established on highly diverse and productive sites, like Wah'Kon-Tah Prairie, placing the beetles one step closer to recovery.

Basic Archery

Basic Shotgun

This program will teach the basics of shotgun shooting. Beginning Atlatl

July 23 • Saturday • 9 a.m. – noon

(Ages 11 and up)

Come join our experts and learn the art of atlatl. The atlatl predates the bow and arrow. In 2010 the atlatl became a legal method of harvesting deer in Missouri. It is used to throw a 4 to 6 foot long, spear-like projectile known as a dart. The atlatl is a wooden shaft approximately a foot-and-a-half long with a socket or knock at the rear to engage the dart. The dart is placed along the shaft with its back end resting in the socket or knock. The hunter grips the atlatl near its front end and performs a forward throw using the upper arm and wrist. The flipping motion of the atlatl creates angular momentum that propels the dart with greater speed and power than can be achieved with the arm alone. This program will meet in the August A. Busch Conservation Area Regional Office classrooms. (Reservations begin June 23.)


