

## Area Highlights

The area contains the Pharrs Island group and the Clarksville Refuge. The area is dominated by forest with marsh and open backwater habitats occurring in Clarksville Refuge. A rock dike was constructed around the head and east side of Pharrs Island to create backwater fish habitats and to slow siltation rates within the island complex.

## Recreational Opportunities

Bird Watching – Fishing – Hiking – Hunting  
Outdoor Photography – Wildlife Viewing

*Conservation Areas are closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. except for authorized camping, fishing and hunting activities.*

- No fireworks.
- No open fires except in designated areas.
- Dogs must be leashed when not used for training or hunting.
- Nuts, berries, fruits, mushrooms and wild greens may be taken for personal use. Cutting or removing other vegetation is prohibited.
- Walk-in camping is allowed year round, **except** during all firearms deer and turkey seasons. During these seasons, camping is not permitted. Campers are limited to 14 consecutive days in a 30-day period. Groups of more than 10 campers need a special-use permit.
- Target shooting is not allowed.

## Fishing and Boating

*Fishing is permitted under statewide regulations for the Mississippi River with the following exceptions:*

- Bullfrogs and green frogs may not be taken with firearms.
- Seining or trapping live bait, including tadpoles, is prohibited.
- Salvage seining of non-game fish for personal use is permitted only with written authorization.
- There are no Conservation Department restrictions on boats and motors used on the waters of the Mississippi River.

## Hunting and Trapping

*Area is open to hunting under statewide regulations with the following exceptions:*

- Deer hunting is permitted under statewide seasons and limits.
- Only portable tree stands are allowed and only from Sept. 1 through Jan. 31. Unattended stands must be plainly labeled on a durable material with the full name and address, or conservation number, of the owner and be removed from the area before February 1. Use of nails, screw-in steps, and any material or method that would damage the tree is prohibited.
- Waterfowl hunting is under statewide regulations
- The Clarksville Refuge is closed to all hunting and is closed to all public use from October 15 to the end of the prescribed duck season.
- Blinds may be constructed on-site, but only from willows and non-woody vegetation.
- Decoys and portable blinds are permitted but must be removed daily.

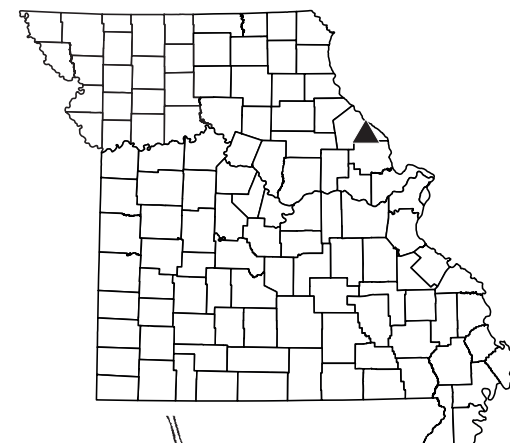
