Recreational Opportunities

Hunting – Camping – Hiking – Nature Study and Wildlife Viewing – Outdoor Photography – Target Shooting – Bicycling – Horseback Riding

Conservation Areas are closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. except for authorized camping, fishing, and hunting activities.

- No littering.
- No fireworks.
- No open fires except in designated camping areas.

• Dogs must be leashed when not used for training or hunting. Special-use permits are required for field and retriever trials.

• Nuts, berries, fruits, mushrooms, and wild greens may be taken for personal use. Cutting or removing other vegetation is prohibited.

• Motor vehicles are allowed on public roadways and in parking areas.

• Horseback riding and biking are allowed on the 11-mile trail system. Multi-use trails open except during all portions of the firearms deer hunting season and during shooting hours of the spring turkey hunting seasons. Groups of more than 10 need a special-use permit. Horses must be kept from crop fields and wildlife food plots.

• For safety reasons target shooting is permitted only at the shooting range.

• Primitive camping is permitted in spots designated on the area map. Campers are limited to 14 consecutive days within a 30-day period. Groups of more than 10 campers need a special-use permit. All camping is first come-first served basis.

Fishing and Boating

There are no fishing opportunities on this area.

• Seining or trapping live bait, including tadpoles, is prohibited.

Hunting and Trapping

Hunting is allowed under statewide regulations with the following exceptions:

• Deer and turkey regulations are subject to annual changes. Please refer to the Spring Turkey or Fall Deer and Turkey Hunting pamphlets for current regulations.

• Portable tree stands may be used between Sept. 1 and Jan. 31. Stands must be identified with the name and address, or conservation number of the user. Screw-in steps or other materials that would damage the tree are prohibited.

• Furbearer trapping is permitted by specialuse permit.

In Neosho at the Highway 59 and Route HH junction, take Route HH east 3.5 miles.


