

RECREATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES

Bird Watching — Camping — Fishing
Hunting — Wildlife Viewing

Conservation Areas are closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. except for authorized camping, fishing and hunting activities.

- No littering.
- No fireworks.
- No open fires except in designated areas.
- Dogs must be leashed when not used for training or hunting.
- Nuts, berries, fruits, mushrooms and wild greens may be taken for personal use. Cutting or removing other vegetation is prohibited. Taking of wild greens from natural areas is not allowed.
- Motor vehicles are allowed on public roadways and in parking areas.
- Camping is permitted only in designated areas and is limited to 14 consecutive days in a 30-day period. Groups of 10 campers or more must obtain a special use permit.
- Target shooting is prohibited.
- Swimming is not allowed.
- Because water conditions fluctuate greatly with changing river levels, area users are advised to contact the Otter Slough Conservation Area office prior to their trip to the area. Unexpected deep water and hazardous conditions exist when the area is flooded, so use caution while wading and boating.

Fishing and Boating

Fishing is permitted under statewide regulations.

- Salvage seining of non-game fish is permitted seasonally for personal use with a special use permit.
- Boats may be used only for fishing and wildlife-related activities and may not be left unattended overnight.

Hunting and Trapping

Hunting is allowed under statewide regulations with the following exceptions:

- Waterfowl hunting is prohibited on entire area after 1 p.m.
- Non-hunters are prohibited within the shooting areas during the waterfowl season, unless they are members of and remain with a party authorized to use the area.
- Only non-toxic shot, as defined and approved by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, may be possessed and used while hunting.

- All hunters must self check-in prior to hunting. Self check-in stations are located at each of the parking lots. Self check-in rules are posted at each of the self check-in stations.
- Hunters must check out at the check-in station immediately after the close of their hunting trip.
- Deer hunting is permitted under statewide seasons and methods, except only archery methods may be used.
- Portable tree stands may be used between Sept. 1 and Jan. 31. Stands must be identified with the name and address, or conservation number, of the user and must be removed from the area by Feb 1. Screw-in steps or other materials that would damage the tree are prohibited.
- Decoys and portable blinds are permitted but must be removed from the area daily.
- Furbearer trapping is permitted by special use permit.
- Entrance is prohibited in designated refuge areas from November 1 through the prescribed waterfowl season.
- Refuge boundaries remain in effect at all river levels.

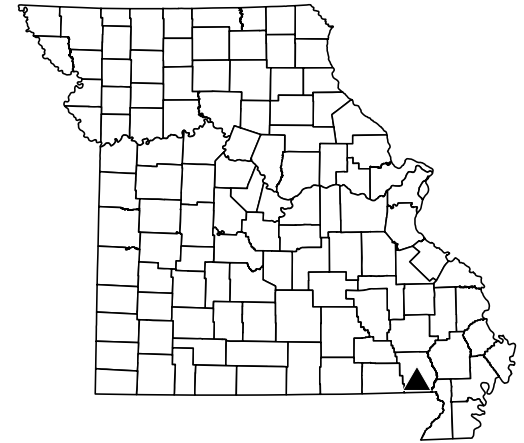
