

About this Area

Fiery Fork Conservation Area is 4.3 miles east of Climax Springs on Highway 7, then 2 miles south down Granger Lane. Watch for signs.

Fiery Fork Conservation Area is in Camden County, 15 miles northwest of Camdenton and 4.3 miles east of Climax Springs, off Highway 7. The area includes 1,509 acres of oak and hickory forest and was named after Fiery Fork Creek, which flows into the Niangua River. During your visit to Fiery Fork Conservation Area, you may view various forest improvement practices designed to improve wildlife habitat, maintain watershed quality, enhance tree growth, quality, and species composition. Signs of disturbance are only temporary and the forest will soon return to normal. Hiking trails on the area vary in length from 1/4-mile to 1 1/4-miles and offer ideal opportunities to view wildlife in its natural setting. All boundaries of the area are marked from tree to tree with blue paint and are posted where they intersect state and county roads or private lands. Visitors are urged to respect the rights of adjacent land owners.

Rules and Regulations

Open for public use from 4:00 a.m. to 10:00 p.m.; hunting, fishing, trapping, camping, dog training, launching and landing boats allowed 24 hours a day on areas where these activities are permitted.

- Use of fireworks are prohibited.
- Nuts, berries, fruits, edible wild greens and mushrooms may be taken only for personal consumption.
- No horseback riding opportunities except on public roadways.
- Pets and hunting dogs are permitted but must be on a leash or confined at all time. Hunting dogs may be used off the leash and unconfined for hunting and training purposes. Hunting permit required to train dogs in pursuit of wildlife.
- Vehicles are only permitted on public roadways and in parking lots.
- Camping is allowed anytime in designated camping areas. Stays are limited to 14 consecutive days in a 30-day period. For any activity with groups of 10 or more need a special use permit. Contact area manager.

Fishing and Boating

Fishing and frogging are permitted under statewide regulations. The following special regulations also apply.

- In lakes and ponds, daily limits are catfish in the aggregate (channel catfish, blue catfish, flathead catfish), four (4); black bass, six (6); crappie, thirty (30); and all other fish, statewide limits, but not to exceed twenty (20) in the aggregate. On lakes and ponds, black bass more than twelve inches (12”) but less than fifteen inches (15”) total length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after beight caught. For stream regulations, refer to the Missouri Fishing Regulations Summary.
- Boats may be used for fishing and wildlife related activities only and may not be stored or left unattended overnight.

Hunting and Trapping

Area is open to hunting under statewide regulations. The following special regulations also apply.

- Only portable stands are allowed from September 1 through January 31. Unattended stands must be plainly labeled on durable material with the full name and address or Conservation number of the owner and be removed from the area by February 1st. Use of nails, screw-in steps, and any material or method that would damage the tree is prohibited.
- Trapping allowed only with special use permit. Contact area manager.
- Trail and game cameras are prohibited.
- Deer and turkey regulations are subject to annual changes. Please refer to Spring Turkey or Fall Deer and Turkey summaries for current regulations.

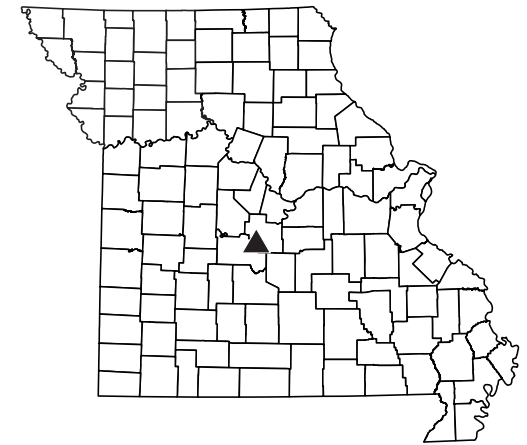
