Recreational Opportunities

Bird Watching – Hunting – Fishing – Hiking – Wildlife Viewing – Picnicking – Frogging

Rules and Regulations

Conservation Areas are closed from 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. except for authorized fishing and hunting activities.

- No littering, dumping, fireworks, open fires, camping and target shooting.
- No free-running pets. Dogs must be leashed or confined when not being trained or used for hunting.
- Destroying, cutting or removing vegetation is prohibited. Nuts, berries, fruits, edible wild greens and mushrooms may be taken only for personal consumption.
- Motor vehicles are restricted to roadways and parking areas. No vehicles or bicycles are allowed off-road.
- · Horseback riding is prohibited.
- Swimming, scuba diving, water skiing, sailboarding, skateboarding, caving and rappelling are not allowed.
- Collecting plants, animals or artifacts, removing water and digging or otherwise disturbing the soil are prohibited.
- Livestock, aircraft and commercial vendors are not allowed.
- Trail and game cameras are prohibited.

Fishing and Boating

Fishing is allowed under statewide regulations with the following exceptions: Stream fishing is permitted under statewide regulations.

- On impounded waters, daily limits are two black bass, four catfish in the aggregate (channel, blue, and flathead catfish) and 30 crappie. All other fish are not to exceed a combined total of 20.
- In lakes and ponds, fish may be taken only by pole and line and no more than three poles and lines may be used by any one person.
- Black bass less than 15 inches in total length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught.
- Bullfrogs and green frogs may be taken during the statewide season only by hand, handnet, atlatl, gig, bow, snagging, snaring, grabbing, crossbow and pole and line.
- Firearms may not be used to take bullfrogs and green frogs.
- Seining or trapping live bait, including tadpoles, is prohibited on impounded waters and their discharge channels.

- Salvage seining of non-game fish for personal use is permitted only with written permission of the Conservation Department.
- Boats may be used for fishing and wildlife activities only and may not be stored or left unattended overnight.
- Electric motors only are allowed on area lakes. There are no motor restrictions on area streams.

Hunting and Trapping

The following special regulations apply:

- Deer and turkey regulations are subject to annual changes. Refer to Spring Turkey or Fall Deer and Turkey booklets for current regulations.
- Firearms firing single projectiles are prohibited.
- Waterfowl hunting is prohibited after 1 p.m.
- Small game and turkey hunting is permitted under statewide regulations.
- Only portable tree stands are allowed and only from September 1 through January 31 on areas where deer hunting is allowed, by Special Use Permit, or except as otherwise authorized. Unattended stands must be plainly labeled on a durable material with the full name and address, or Conservation Number, of the owner and be removed from the area before February 1. Use of nails, screw-in steps, and any material or method that would damage the tree is prohibited.
- Decoys and blinds are permitted but must be removed from the area daily and may not be left unattended between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 4:00 a.m. Blinds may not be constructed on-site from woody vegetation except for willows.
- Trapping of furbearers is permitted only as specifically authorized by Special Use Permit.




